#### **PASTOR'S PIECE**

At the recent Bishop's Mid-Winter Retreat, one evening our worship experience was lead by Boe Harris and Raggatha Calentine, conference cochairs of the Committee On Native American Ministries. During this time, they shared stories and songs related to healing. They shared how laughter, dance, stories, and tears can be healing. They also emphasized how, if we would all look beyond color and physical build and listen to one another's stories, we would be Christ-like to one another.

Raggatha shared a story of an event that happened to her in her child-hood, where ultimately she realized how her actions lead to the destruction of another person. At the end of her story, she shared how she has cried tears of sorrow for her actions and tears of repentance. We were asked to share with someone near us about a time when we were bullied and then about a time when we were the bully. We were asked to think about our tears: the ones we cried and the ones we caused.

Then a very powerful moment occurred. Raggatha sat upon a blanket. On the altar table were cups with small amounts of water in them. These cups were to represent our tears. We were invited to come forward, take a cup and pour it over Raggatha. She was going to take upon herself all our tears as we sought repentance and healing. As we came forward, some poured the water and moved on. Some touched Raggatha as they poured the water. Some spoke words to her as they poured the water.

Before I took my turn pouring the water, I sat a watched. As I did this, I found myself thinking of Jesus. In the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus wept in prayer. He wept for all of our sins. His sorrow was so deep, it is said he sweated blood. He cried out as he submitted himself to doing God's will.

On the cross, Christ took all of our sins upon himself in order to offer us forgiveness and salvation. He also cried out from the cross. He cried out for God's forgiveness for everyone. As Christ died on the cross and was buried in the tomb, his followers were filled with sorrow and shed tears of grief.

Then on the third day, the women found the tomb empty. Jesus appeared and speaks to Mary. Later he appeared before the disciples. He spoke to them to give them assurance the he was alive. Jesus turned their sorrow into joy.

When we go before Jesus and pour out our confessions of sin, Jesus begins to heal our sorrows and restore our joy. We are about to embark on our Lenten journey, a time for us to look deep inside, through the help of the Holy Spirit and see what sins we are allowing to interfere in our being the person God has called us to be. When we realize these sins, we need to name them, claim them, confess them, receive forgiveness and be healed. During this season of Lent, let us pour out our tears of sorrow and allow Jesus to turn them into tears of joy and healing.

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### COUNTRY BREAKFAST/CHURCH BLESSING by Jane Brooks and Jerry Adams

Open the door to Wesley Hall on a cold Saturday in February, and you will be greeted by mouth-watering aromas, warm greetings, and good conversation, all of which entice you to come in and spend the morning. There is quite a story behind how the Country Breakfast came about.

At a meeting in January, 1998, Dan Gustafson suggested having a church breakfast for fund raising. Drake and Elizabeth Ferguson played an important part in promoting and working to have the first breakfast and tickets were sold. More monthly breakfasts followed.

Soon the Country Breakfast was a successful event and the schedule was changed to have one the second and fourth Saturdays of each month. Over time the price has also changed. Originally the cost was \$5, but then it was increased to \$6. Currently the cost is \$7 but senior citizens are still \$6. This price is still a bargain because it is "all you can eat!"

There have been changes in leadership over the years, yet all have been good, strong leaders: Drake Ferguson, Tab Brannock, David Hickman, and Jerry Adams who has stepped up to the job twice.

Besides changes in frequency, cost, and leadership, there have been a series of other changes over the years. In the early stages the biscuits were prepared by the Ladies of Faith. The biscuits were enjoyed by all, but it quickly became impractical to continue the homemade treats. Of course many marketing themes have been used, including George Doty's Hunters Breakfast. The concept was that we would open early and hunters could get some breakfast before heading out to their blinds. Apparently the hunters preferred breakfast AFTER they completed hunting. And so our workers arrived early (4:00 am!), but the hunters, probably not believing we would be up so early, did not flock to our event. Needless to say, there were a lot of very sleepy breakfast cooks.

Other innovations included the method of preparations. Many thanks to Les Groves for coming in early to cut potatoes and onions for the hash browns. We added French toast; we added sausage gravy; we added homemade fruit preserves. These innovations show our commitment to provide a high quality meal at a good price. Most of all, it keeps our creative spirits up and makes the event enjoyable for all of our customers and workers alike.

Many people help obtain supplies for the breakfast. The whole congregation donates bags of supplies once or twice a year. Charles Adams has brought tomato juice, and Nancy Dunn goes to Trappe Frozen Food to get different food stuffs. Shirley Adams gets other items as well as seeing there are enough eggs. Pastor Maleia brings the scrapple.

The Country Breakfast is a success because the cooperation of all involved is outstanding. People take the different tasks from cooking, to serving, to cleaning up, to receiving money at the door, to sweeping floors without being urged. The tables are set by Ida Hickman, Estelle Slaughter, and Libby Slaughter on Fridays before the breakfast scheduled for the net day. They have been doing their tasks for a long time now. Shirley Windsor's Seasonal Flowers has provided flowers for the tables for a long time. And although there has never been a formally designated hostess, for quite a while Ida has worked in the dining room talking with the people, keeping the tables wiped and reset, as well as seeing that the guests can visit in the church sanctuary if they wished. Everyone finds that working together makes this project a blessing for all the workers from Trappe United Methodist and Faith Chapel and a good way of being involved in outreach to the community, too.

A final innovation was holding a yard sale in conjunction with the breakfast, and speaking of outreach, both have provided household goods and sustenance to local families who lost their homes to fires or other disasters.

We would like to recognize those who have worked on the breakfast over the years. If we have inadvertently left any names out, please tell Jane Brooks or Jerry Adams so that those people can be recognized in the next issue of *Tidings*. 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
#### TRAPPE UMC OPENS ITS DOORS FOR A NEW YOUTH GROUP

The second Saturday night of each month, you will find a lively group of kids ranging in age from 5<sup>th</sup> – 8<sup>th</sup> grade in the upstairs hall of Trappe United Methodist Church. The middle school youth group is directed and supported by my husband and me and additional rotating volunteers. Each week the kids meet for dinner, a Bible lesson, crafts, and games. Total, we have seen 22 different souls walk through the door, with an average over the past 3 months of 12 people per meeting. I invite the children from approximately 40 local families each month via phone calls and Facebook. Many of the families, who have not yet attended due to scheduling conflicts, are interested in participating in the future. The kids seem to enjoy themselves. They show up early and would stay later if we let them.

There is a strong love of music amongst this group. We have been borrowing the church's projector to show the kids Christian music videos to reinforce the scriptures that we have been studying. During the first three months we have learned about God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. During the study of God the Son, we watched the music video for "Mary Did You Know?" I heard two boys say the video made them cry. One mom told me that her daughter wanted to downloaded the song for her I –POD. Other Christian artists that the kids love include: Toby Mac, Mercy Me, and Kirk Franklin. It brings joy to my heart to hear them singing along and asking to hear the songs again. The songs really seem to hit home the idea that God made us, God dwelt among us, and God lives in us when we receive him.

I know God is working when these tween age kids skip the big Ravens game, ride their bikes and scooters to church and show up with smiles on their face. Working with this group is a highlight in my life. I want to thank the congregation for opening the doors and paying for the heating and air conditioning and allowing us to use the upstairs kitchen. The library is packed with inspirational books to help accomplish all manner of resolutions and challenges. There is a shelf of daily devotionals for ongoing enrichment of our prayer life in order to tackle any situation. I was perusing the library and found books addressing many specific issues.

- Dare to Discipline and Bringing up Boys by Dr. James Dobson are in the family section. One is self-explanatory and the other is a great guide for the unique challenge of raising normal, active boys.
- The Power of a Praying Woman by Stormie Omartian shows us how to draw closer to God and know his plans and purpose for our lives. It tell us how to draw comfort, help and strength for each day.
- What Makes a Man by Bill McCartney: Today's society needs men of conviction, integrity and action. This book offers 12 promises that will help apply those traits across the span of our adult responsibilities
- Get Out of That Pit by Beth Moore gives us straight talk about God's deliverance from hopelessness.

Looking for a life changing challenge? Read *Voices of The Faithful* by Beth Moore. This is a daily devotional with inspiring stories by people serving around the world
