#### Pastor's Piece

Just recently, I attended the Bishop's Mid-Winter Retreat in Ocean City, MD. It was a wonderful time to connect with friends and engage in some thought provoking theological questions. There were two things that really touched me during this time. The first was getting to hear via video some testimonial from the Rev. Claire Wimbush. Rev. Claire is a 28 year-old Episcopalian pastor who has lived with cerebral palsy her entire life. Her comments are part of the Clergy Health Initiative conducted by Leadership Education at Duke Divinity. Rev. Claire challenged us to think about the difference between health and wholeness. She also shared with us how she has theologically reconciled her disability with being a part of the body of Christ. Being a person without a physical disability, hearing Rev. Claire share made me realize how easy it is to disregard a person with a disability as not being a part of the body of Christ, of not having gifts to share. This is absolutely not true. Those who have disabilities are a part of the body of Christ and are a part of the diversity of the Church. Because Rev. Claire's comments are part of the Clergy Health Initiative's teaching workshops they are unavailable for us to share with our congregations. But, they are anticipating being able to make them available later this year. I truly hope so, because she will make you think.

As many have come to realize, Bishop Johnson is passionate about making sure people with disabilities have a place in our worship services. She was so thrilled at how many in the deaf community responded to an invitation to join us for a special performance by a group called B.E.L.I.E.V.E. (which stands for Being Empowered, Living Inspired, Exemplifying Victory Every Day). This group is an American Sign Language Theatrical Performance Company. Currently all of their members are hearing, but know American Sign Language (ASL). They are open to and hope to have more from the deaf community join the company. They combine, ASL, dance and dramatic interpretation as part of their program that glorifies God. They use humor and drama. It was awesome to watch them dance and sign at the same time to praise songs like "How Great Is Our God." I am hoping that my colleagues here in Trappe will join with me in inviting them to come to our community and share their gifts with us.

Overall, there was a lot of emphasis upon diversity and bringing our differences together to have a richer worship experience instead of letting differences divide us. Jesus came for all people: therefore, we need to find ways for all of us to worship and work for the Kingdom of God together.



Discussions are formalized with motions made, seconded, and passed.

All members of the charge are affected by the decisions of the Council; therefore, it is important for all to know what is discussed and approved at the monthly meetings. Please note that the meetings are open to the members of the churches.

#### Team Visitation Ministry Trappe/Bruceville UMC Charge (Updated November 15, 2011)

There needs to be an orientation for any laity taking part in this ministry before visitations are scheduled.

## **Purpose:**

- Find out if help with practical assistance is needed
- Comfort those who grieve
- Listening to needs of shut-ins and hospitalized
- Team visit those that wish to have visitors (within the charge)

## Who Needs to Be Visited:

- Elderly people still living independently especially if they are shut-ins
- Elderly or disabled people living in nursing homes
- People who are sick for prolonged periods of time
- People who are hospitalized
- Bereaved people and families

## Who Should Do the Visitation:

Visitation teams of 2-3 people (Laity and/or Pastor) that are comfortable comforting and encouraging those members of the churches that have requested a visit from within the charge

Please note that this does not mean that those who are already performing this visitation ministry (Pastor and/or laity) will not stop as this is to encourage more visitations by others in the future Visiting is a viable ministry for people with this kind of gift and/or personality especially if their heart reaches out to people who are hurting, lonely, or in need

## Specifics for laity member visitations:

- 1. Two-three members make-up visitation team
- 2. Names provided by charge members
- 3. Initiate contact by phone first
- 4. First visit should be 30 minutes or less in duration
- 5. Offer to prayer for any concerns
- 6. Discuss on-going church charge programs (using bulletin and charge brochure)
- 7. Leave something small behind as reminder of visit
- 8. Pray as team that they enjoyed their visit and ask for a repeat visit in the future

# What Should Happen in a Typical Visit:

- 1. Spend most of your time listening (let them talk)
- 2. Respect their space, property, and time
- 3. Be sensitive with the kind of stories that you tell
- 4. Extend the gift of touch (hug, hand on shoulder, holding their hands)
- 5. Offer to pray with them
- 6. Leave something with them (card, flower, last week's bulletin, food)

Quarterly team feedback assessments are encouraged.


