PASTOR'S PIECE

In the book of Exodus, the story of the Israelites leaving Egypt can be found. The Israelites had been held as slaves in Egypt for hundreds of years and cried out to God for freedom. God heard their cries and responded by sending Moses to lead the people after bringing a series of plagues upon the Pharaoh for not granting Moses' request to let the Israelites go. When they were finally free to leave Egypt, what began next could be described as a "desert wilderness experience". Even though they had been freed from slavery, they still griped and complained and as a result wandered in the desert for 40 years.

Today, when a person seems to be going through a spiritually tough time or a faith crisis, it can be referred to as a "desert wilderness experience" because the person feels alone, that even God is not listening. Jesus had his wilderness experience when he spent 40 days in the desert being tempted by Satan. Thankfully, Jesus, even though he might have felt alone, still drew upon the word of God and held out hope that he would be set free from the wilderness. Because of his example, we too can hold out hope in our wilderness experiences.

As we are about to move into the season of Lent, we can also enter into a wilderness experience. Lent is a time to examine ourselves and ask that anything that is not pleasing to God be removed. It is a time to repent of sin in our lives. For some, it becomes a time to give up something sacrificially, like sweets, an unhealthy habit, or maybe even ourselves as we accept Christ as Lord and Savior. (It was during the season of Lent that I realized the need for Christ as my Savior and made the commitment to follow him).

Whether or not we are in the season of Lent, these wilderness experiences can occur and the way for us to deal with them is to remember Christ's experience. We have to have hope and understand that although we may not think so, God is with us, and God will bring us through. For the last several days, I've had the beginning of the hymn, "My Hope Is Built" running through my mind: "My hope is built on nothing less than Jesus' blood and righteousness." Let your hope be built on Jesus and just like him, you will emerge from your wilderness experience feeling revived, refreshed, and ready to serve God in any way you are called.

MEMORIES OF MY SECOND SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS by Charles Adams, Jr.

The November issue of the *Tidings* included the report about my First Sunday School Class, and since many people spoke to me about enjoying reading that report, I will undertake to do a report about my second Sunday School Class. This class was held in the small room on the right side of the Church, which is now used as a utility room, and is the location of part of the heating equipment for the Sanctuary. Also, anyone coming into the Sanctuary in a wheel chair normally uses the ramp that is outside of the exterior door to this room.

The class was for boys and girls that were in School Grades two and three, and many times the teacher of this class was the wife of the minister. In my case, the teacher was Rev. Henry Schauer's wife, who was named Frances. Each Sunday, we would receive a small pamphlet with a picture on the front page, and a story that related to the picture. Also there were questions that we had to give answers to that related to this picture and story. We got to take our pamphlet home with us at the end of the class.

Each year the Sunday School had a Christmas Program on Sunday night, about a week before Christmas Day. We students would each have a "piece" to learn and say at this Christmas Program which was conducted by the Sunday School Superintendent. Santa Claus would arrive just as this program was ending, and he would have a small box of candy and an orange to give to each of the children present.

Easter was also a special time for the children in the Sunday School. On Easter Saturday, there would be an Easter Egg Hunt for all of the Sunday School children. Each of the children had to have a basket to carry when we were searching for the eggs that were hidden around the Church Yard. It was always great fun to see who found the most eggs. We were in this class for two years; then we were ready to move to either the Junior Girls Class or the Junior Boys Class . Hopefully I will be able to give you a report about the Junior Boys Class in the next *Tidings*.

Following our time of enjoying food and fellowship, the women began their careful selection of 12 cookies to a zip lock bag, while the men placed a Christmas message (prepared by Pastor Maleia) in a small bag to include with each bag of cookies. Mr. Lee Roberts was with us, and we helped him load his vehicle to transport 100 bags of cookies to their destination. How do we express our "thanks" to those who provided cookies to fill 120 bags? Perhaps it can be said best by the recipients of the cookies:

I would like you to know just how much your Christmas comforts really mean to me, especially as an inmate here at the Talbot County Detention Center. If not for being placed here when I was, I fear that my outcome would have been grim. I also know that the good Lord will keep me here no longer than He sees fit. My name is Charlie and I am currently incarcerated at the Talbot County Detention Center. I am 24 years old. I just wanted to say THANK YOU for the delicious cookies you made for all of us here! However, I firmly believe that God is using me so I can learn from this and help someone in the future going through a similar situation! Once again, thank you very much for thinking of us on Christmas!


