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LIBRARY NEWS by Charlotte Edwards

Happy New Year, everyone. By now we have settled into January, acknowledged our resolutions, and set out goals. Every bit of that is much easier said than done. We all know our struggles. Don't forget our library for information, guidance, and inspiration to address varied problems and to enrich our lives.

Unfortunately there are a lot of people probably not so far away that are facing seemingly insurmountable challenges. These are the people targeted by Project Purple. It includes their friends and families, too. Project Purple addresses a huge crisis.

A letter written over 100 years ago describes cocaine use in dark unrelenting reality. The language is stilted but describes how drug use can spiral into "a debilitating obsession:"

The most alarming poisonous effects of the drug are: debasement and enslavement of the will, a general demor alizing which is as diabolical as it is indescribable and which tends rapidly toward depravity and the develop ment of everything that is degrading and ignoble in human nature. Habits of the most detestable character are: settled indifference to every interest in life, destruction of the most noble affections and affirmations, the utter death of all noble qualities, complete disregard of all social and domestic duties, even of pressing family necessi ties and the common interests of daily life, the radical extinction of every previous religious spark that had enl ivened the soul and the development of the most intense selfishness. These are the results of indulgence in the most powerful and devilish drug which it has been the misfortune of man to abuse.

SCARY isn't it? Meanwhile drugs have developed beyond this horror and are killing people. Everyone is affected by this epidemic.

What to do? There is no magic cure in our library. People's needs are individualized, so we need to know as much as possible to provide positive guidance and inspiration. Books we do have as a beginning are: **The Balanced Life** by Alan Loy McGinnis

Making Good Habits and Breaking Bad Habits, Straight Talk, and God is Not Mad at You, all by Joyce Meyer

Getting Through What You're Through by Robert Schuller

You Never Stop Being a Parent by Helen Hosier

Life's Healing Choices by John Baker.

Parents, Peers, and Pot, Parents in Action. Published by US Dept. of Health and Human Services.

We had books about AA but they were given to someone in need. Actually this article is a crusade for more current literature and pamphlets for our library and The Little Free Library. Don't forget: there is always a Bible out there for anyone who asks.

Meanwhile pray for Project Purple, look for your place to help, and learn, live, and share the Twelve Steps that are used very effectively by AA and NA. Don't forget to read something fun as often as possible for your own mental health.

Here are the 12 Steps as defined by Alcoholics Anonymous:

- 1. We admitted we were powerless over alcohol-that our lives had become unmanageable.
- 2. Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.
- 3. Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him.
- 4. Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.
- 5. Admitted to God, to ourselves and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs.
- 6. Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character
- 7. Humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings
- 8. Made a list of persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.
- 9. Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.
- 10. Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.
- 11. Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.
- 12. Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics and to practice these principles in all our affairs. (https://www.addictioncenter.com)
