NOVEMBER MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

It's an easy thing to get so caught up in the hustle and bustle of life that we forget to stop working, to cease bouncing from point A to point B, to halt moving from one task to another. It is an easy thing to forget to **or** to choose not to stop one day a week to remember to keep it holy. I am certain it has been a problem for people from the earliest of times. I am convinced that if stopping, resting, honoring God was something humanity would do automatically without reminding, God would not have included the reminder to remember in God's directions to God's people as they were traversing the wilderness. You know the reminder I am talking about, right? It's the longest of God's ordinances found in Exodus 20:

⁸ Remember the Sabbath day, and keep it holy. ⁹For six days you shall labour and do all your work. ¹⁰But the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. ¹¹For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and consecrated it.

Even with this direction at our disposal we modern folk with our jam-packed calendars still face the weekly challenge of setting aside one day or even a few hours of one day of a seven day week where we put on hold our desire to be in constant motion. When challenged about the Sabbath practices of himself and his disciples, Jesus reminded those present that "the Sabbath was made for humankind, and not humankind for the Sabbath" When we fail to remember, honor and keep holy a time of Sabbath, we deprive ourselves of one of God's greatest gifts to us, a time of rest and rejuvenation in the arms of our Lord and Savior.

Things for us to consider this month include asking ourselves: "Has Sunday become something other than a day of Sabbath rest in our lives?" "Has attending worship become an item to be left off the schedule because the weekend is coming to an end and we believe that we have fifty other things to accomplish before bedtime, and if we take time for worship, there is no way we will accomplish all of them?" "How might we transform Sunday so that it may be the God given agent of transformation that it is meant to be in our lives?" "How might we set as our number one priority the fulfilling of our need for Sabbath rest and rejuvenation in the arms of our Lord and Savior Jesus?"

As we move into November and as school, work and holiday activities begin to expand and fill our calendars, I invite each of us to remember what God has done for us and to embrace and receive God's gift of Sabbath with grateful hearts. May we keep Sunday holy by coming together in community to sing God's praises and to seek God's blessing for the week to come.

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DECEMBER MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

Have you ever had the feeling in the middle of a conversation that somehow something got lost in the translation? You know, a time when one thing is said and another thing has been heard altogether? There are times when something can literally get lost in the translation. Such a thing can occur when a writing is translated from one language into another. For example, Psalm 119 and 145 lose their literary base when translated from Hebrew to English. The base of the psalms in their original language of Hebrew is a poetic devise known as an acrostic. In the case of these two psalms their base is made up of an acrostic of the Hebrew alphabet. When we read the psalms in English, the acrostic gets lost in the translation.

When the religious seasons of **Advent**, **Christmas** and **Epiphany** are translated into the language of the secular world something or someone often gets lost in the translation. **Advent** is a four week season of spiritual preparation and renewal in the church. Secular advent is a time of hurried running from store to store (or frantic last-minute internet searches and purchases), meal planning, travel arranging, party attending, school pageants, and overspending that extends over a period of close to two months. **Christmas** and **Epiphany** are seasons of celebration and joy in which Christians recount through worship and fellowship with friends and family God's coming into the world as an innocent baby so that we might know the depth of God's love for us by God's actual presence with us. The secular season of Christmas, on the other hand, can get twisted and turned into a time where more is better, and securing the latest gadget justifies any and all actions along the way. During **Epiphany**, while Christians are still celebrating God incarnate with us, the secular world is celebrating its season of post-holiday returns and sales. Somehow, somewhere in all of this, Jesus can and does get lost in the translation.

As disciples of Jesus our lives are ones in which we are challenged to balance the secular and the religious understandings of this most holy time of year. May nothing get lost in the translation for us this **Advent**, **Christmas** and **Epiphany**. May we know and experience the joy and true love of God, Emmanuel-God with us, as we remember the birth of our risen Lord, Jesus the Christ.

THE UPPER ROOM by Jane Brooks

The Upper Room is a small booklet that is placed in the sanctuary by the United Methodist Women for the congregation. It is a collection of daily devotional material, which includes suggested Scripture readings, as well as a selected Bible verse or two. Also a brief discussion or highlight is the main part, which can be an explanation of the Bible verse, a current story, or previous experiences of the person writing the material for that day's entry. There are pictures of some of the contributors with a brief biographical sketch included. Each issue covers two months. The Upper Room is good to use during your daily devotional time.

The UMW places copies of *The Upper Room* on the wide window sills under the two windows in the back of the Sanctuary. A new issue will soon be out for November and December. They hope you will enjoy reading these inspirational devotional booklets, which are free for the taking.

If you find all the copies are gone, or if you cannot get to church to pick up a copy, you can find a link to *The Upper Room* on the church's web site at http://www.tfcumc.org/ Click on **Daily Devotional** in the box on the left side of the screen.

Another Source for Weekly Devotion

The church's website also lists **Scripture Reflection** in the box on the left side of the home page. This reflection is based on the lectionary Scripture selections for the week and Pastor Mary Catherine's sermon. John Sewell writes the reflection and includes it in the card that is sent to anyone who has missed the Sunday service. Web Master Bob Croswell then posts the reflection on the web site. It is the message "in a nutshell" and helps keep people in tune with the Scripture and the sermon.

Visitors to the web site are encouraged to read the complete Scripture selections, contemplate the thought, and pray about the meaning God has for them in the words of both.



This year, we are invited to experience Advent and Christmas with Mary. Imagine Jesus from Mary's point of view—proud of her son, in awe of his gifts and mission, guided by love for him as a person and so much more. In this book, Adam Hamilton begins at the end, with Mary at the crucifixion and resurrection; travels back in time as she witnesses his life and ministry; and ends at the beginning, with the Christ child born in a stable, Mary's beautiful baby.


The youth Christmas Party will be December 13 at 6:30 pm. The UMW will be involved , supplying the food for the dinner.

January 2015 Worship Notes

January 4: Epiphany of the Lord Sunday

Isaiah 60:1-6 and Matt 2:1-12

Did you know---The Epiphany (Manifestation) of the Lord (January 6), an event more ancient celebration among Christians than Christmas, originally focused on the nativity, incarnation, and baptism of Christ. Today we celebrate the coming of the three wise men (magi), who brought gifts to the Christ child. For this reason, in Puerto Rico and in most Latin American countries this day is observed as Three Kings Day or Dia de Los Reyes. It marks the end of the Christmas Cycle, which began the First Sunday of Advent. The Latino culture has preserved and developed this ancient celebration in a way that is a great gift to the whole Church. Within the church service, this day is celebrated with plays and special songs emphasizing the coming of the kings and their gifts for the Christ Child. In the home the children are told to place boxes filled with hay under their beds so that the camels will eat the hay and leave presents for the children. (The United Methodist Book of Worship, p.295)

January 11: Baptism of the Lord

Acts 19:1-7 and Mark 1:4-11

On this Sunday the Church traditionally celebrates the baptism of Jesus the Christ by John the Baptist. We will remember and celebrate the oneness we have in Christ through our own baptisms by engaging in A Congregational Reaffirmation of the Baptismal Covenant.

January 18: **Human Relations Day**

1 Sam 3:1-20 and John 1:43-51

Observed on the Sunday before the observance of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday, this day calls the Church to recognize the right of all God's children to realize their potential as human beings in relationship with one another.

January 25: 3rd Sunday after the Epiphany

1Corin 7:29-31 and Mark 1:14-20
